September 28th was not just another day in Palu on the island of Sulawesi. It was a day of celebration as the city residents gathered to commemorate the city's 30th anniversary. Hundreds of people assembled at the beach where the festival was being held looking, forward to a joyful Friday evening with friends and family. Then a strong earthquake hit the city, followed by a major earthquake off the coast felt almost 200 miles away. Although lives were lost and damage was done, life went on as earthquakes are a fairly normal occurrence in the ring of fire. The

tsunami alert was lifted and the festival resumed.

Then without warning, an almost 10 foot tall wave swept through the city leaving death and destruction in its wake. Entire districts and villages were consumed by the earth as the soil beneath it gave way. Mudslides and aftershocks continued to obliterate the city.

Over 2,200 people lost their lives, and more than 1,000 people are still missing. Additionally, tens of thousands of homes were destroyed and just as many people were displaced; all of whom desperately needed aid.

MAF was immediately called to action and started



the relief effort through our Indonesian entity, Yayasan MAF. With roads destroyed, transporting people, medicine and other aid could have been impossible, but with MAF's Kodiak and a helicopter from Helivida they were able to accomplish just that. Medicine, doctors, food, shelter and much more life saving aid was brought in through the tool of aviation following the tragedy, and that's just what MAF does all over the world every day.

We would like to thank you for the support you give so that ministry like this can happen. Additionally, your support provides for the needs of MAF employees like us. One of the ways MAF cares for us is through a fund to help with travel expenses not covered under our medical plan, such as our travel to Jakarta for Benaya's delivery.
