They protected, they prayed, they cried for the pall of shame cast over their village. They risked their lives, made a plan, and saw Alex to safety. And then... radio silence.

For 16 months the village of Pagamba had no airplane to serve it. Their connection to the outside world had been cut off, while the ashes of an MAF plane haunted their airstrip. During that time, MAF's attempts to return and reopen the strip were constantly roadblocked. But "The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness" (2 Peter 3:9). On May 20th Alex and a group of others were able to return for the first time since January of 2021.

The airplane was greeted with celebration. Joy was the theme of the day. The community had prepared a celebration for the visitors. An alter of remembrance was constructed, stone by stone, each person recounted God's faithful love and unwavering presence with them in their trials, from the time the gospel first entered their lonely valley. And of course, no Papuan celebration is complete without a pig roast.
